ABOUT OUR CLUB

“The objects of the Club shall be to foster the interest and control of the game of hockey in the Sutherland Shire; and to give an opportunity to amateur junior and senior players in the abovementioned Shire to participate in the game of hockey.”

From the Constitution of Sutherland District Hockey Club Inc

“Sutherland District Men’s Hockey Club” was formed in November 1965 and with the help and generosity of Sutherland Council began playing in 1966 at Woollooware Oval. The Club’s home was moved to Sylvania Hockey Park for the 1968 season. In 1980, the Club amalgamated with 3 disbanding Women’s Clubs to expand and include senior and junior Women players as members, and provide an opportunity for women to participate in local SSWHA Competitions.

Over the years the facilities at Hockey Park have been developed to be amongst the best in Sydney. The Clubhouse was officially opened on March 22nd 1980, at which time we had two grass fields for hockey. The first synthetic sand field was laid in 1990, and the first synthetic water-based surface was laid in 2001. These endeavours were made possible by contributions from Club members, Club sponsors, Club supporters, Sutherland Shire Council, and the NSW Department of Sport and Recreation.

The Club is currently one of the largest in Sydney. In 2019, 8 men’s teams, 3 women’s teams and 13 junior teams (mixed) represented Sutherland District Hockey Club. In addition to this, the Club’s Friday Minkey programme continues to grow, and our Summer Schools Hockey Competition run for local Primary and High Schools is one of the largest in Australia.

OUR CLUB EMBLEM



Our current Club emblem was adopted in 1996. While clearly depicting our Club name, the emblem keeps traditional elements of previous club designs with the crossed sticks and contemporary representation of the traditional Namandi spirit Adungen, or Aranga.

In Aboriginal mythology there are three types of spirits: the familiar, the harmless, and the malignant, or Namandi. Namandi spirits are feared most of all because many set out to harm and kill Aborigines. This included stealing the spirits of sick men, consuming the living, and causing great disasters such as droughts and floods.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

We started the season in the best possible way when on March 9 we held the official opening ceremony for our new playing surface. This represented a \$350,000 investment in updating our playing facilities (including a refurbishment of the watering system), and was closely followed by an update to the kitchen / cooking facilities to give us an excellent facility refresh for the start of the season. Particular thanks to Peter Tait and Bill Melchert in taking the lead on these activities.

There are comprehensive reports on our Junior, Senior Women's and Senior Men's programs later in this document, but briefly

Our Junior program, under the leadership of Junior Convenor David Richardson, again had an excellent year – with 13 junior teams plus a well attended Minkey program, it's a large operation. Well done to all coaches, managers, Age Coordinators and others that assisted.

Our three Senior Women's teams, again under the leadership of Women's Convenor Lee-Anne Callinan and Senior Women's Head Coach Sarah Dredge, each performed credibly in the Sydney East competitions, with our 3rd grade Wildcats making the semi-finals this year. The Sutho Ladies Day, despite some appalling weather, was another season highlight, and this year featured a junior training clinic conducted by the 1st grade team on the day.

In our Senior Men's program, under the leadership of Men's Convenor Andrew Hoy:

- An increase in playing numbers enabled us to field a record 8 senior men's team this year, up from 6 teams just two years ago
- Our top 5 men's teams all reached semi-finals in the Sydney Hockey competition, a terrific demonstration of improved playing quality through our senior grades, with our 1st grade team reaching the Grand Final

We held our Senior and Junior end of season presentation events over the weekend of 21 and 22 September – which was much earlier than our usual late October dates – and that seemed to be generally well received.

In addition to the efforts of our Convenors in running their programs, at Committee level I would particularly like to recognise the contribution this year of Luke Domrow as our new Treasurer. Luke brought great energy and expertise to our Committee discussions and the Treasurer role, and with the invaluable assistance of Mags Noy as Assistant Treasurer, Luke ensured the management and reporting of our financial affairs was of the highest standard.

Our Club benefits significantly from the support and involvement of a terrific group of Sponsors, led by Tradies as our Major Sponsor, along with the support of Eleni Petinos, MP for Miranda, and Carmelo Pesce and the team at Sutherland Council. We are very appreciative of this.

As a community based organisation, our Club thrives and prospers due to the positive involvement of many, many volunteers. Thanks to all who volunteered in some way in 2019!

TREASURER'S REPORT

Financial Performance and Position

I am pleased to report on the Sutherland District Hockey Club's financial performance for the 12 months ending 30 September 2019, being a net surplus of \$26,575 (2018: \$98,027). The Club's financial position at 30 September 2019 reflects net assets of \$571,685 (2018: \$545,109), with total cash on hand of \$236,757 (2018: \$501,719).

Significant investments and cash outlays

2019 was a significant year for the Club with the finalisation of various capital projects, including the installation of our new Polytan turf in December 2019, an upgrade to our watering system, new training goals and storage areas, and a partial kitchen upgrade. These items have enhanced our facilities significantly. The total cost to date for the club of these investments is almost \$360,000 and our cash reserves reduced significantly requiring the Committee to adopt a responsible approach to ensuring the sustainability of the Club's finances.

I would like to especially acknowledge the financial contributions from our Federal Member (Hon Scott Morrison MP), and State Member (Ms Eleni Petinos MP) to these capital projects. Their ongoing support of our Hockey Club is much appreciated and ensures that both our Junior and Senior players can enjoy playing hockey on an Olympic standard surface.

Implementation of new club administration system

The implementation of our new club administration system (Majestri) in January simplified the registration process and allowed the Club to move away from a paper-based registration and fee collection process enhancing the timing of fee collections and providing members with better options for payment plans. I would like to express my thanks to Sarah Dredge for her timeless efforts in planning, implementation and testing of the new system.

Player fees

The Committee undertook a detailed analysis of membership fees prior to the start of the season with a focus on ensuring our fees encouraged participation, remained competitive, and ensured the sustainability of the Club's finances and facilities in the long term. The findings suggested our player fees were highly competitive and trended in the mid to low end of the sample of other clubs in Sydney across our Men, Women and Juniors.

Growth in participation, the implementation of Majestri, and small fee increases ensured growth in our membership revenue by 9% to \$82,975 (2018: \$76,310) bringing playing revenue more in line with our direct playing expenses, which was a key strategic objective of the Committee.

Sponsorship

Without the support of our sponsors, we would not have funds available to develop our facilities and keep our playing fees competitive. A special thanks must go to Tradies, Gynea Hotel, Sutherland Mazda, Rebound Sports Recovery, Just Hockey, Runnulla, 20/20 Sports Physiotherapy, InsideLine Roofing and More Than Meat.

Canteen and Fundraising

The Canteen realised a profit of \$20,910 (2018: \$18,472) being the best result in the last four years thanks to the generous contributions of all our Club members, valuable contributions of product from More Than Meat, and the planning and buying efforts of John Cowan, Peter Krepp and Trish Krepp.

The Club conducted two new fundraising initiatives in 2019 - a Bunnings BBQ in February and a Chocolate Fundraising Drive, realising a combined profit of \$2,618, with more to come in 2020.

Equipment

The loss in equipment of \$5,395 (2018: loss of \$5,144) reflects the Committee's investment in new equipment such as hockey balls, and umpire shirts, the write-off of old inventory and the Committee's investment in the pricing of supporter gear (at or below cost) as a promotion.

The Club is in a good position to turn this loss around in future years now that the old stock has been written off, and with plans to reduce the fragmentation in our offerings. Thank you to Garry Thomas for all of his efforts in the uniform and equipment room this year. It is often a thankless task, and he implemented the new Majestri ordering process incredibly well.

Costs

The addition of a depreciation charge on the new turf has increased the Club's total book expenses by 18% in 2019 to \$197,205 (2018: \$167,765). After adjusting for depreciation total expenses were slightly down on 2018 reflecting the Committee's responsible approach to managing costs.

A Special Thank You to our Assistant Treasurer

The growth in our Club in recent years means we have become a Tier 1 association for reporting purposes, and managing the club's finances is no small effort.

During 2019, 594 invoices were issued and receipted through Majestri, 1,629 transactions were processed into the accounts through our bank account and square, and almost 200 Active Kids vouchers have been applied for. Internal controls were followed, regulatory compliance requirements satisfied, all paperwork and reports were gathered, reviewed and processed, and everything reconciled.

Much of the hard work in ensuring everything is accounted for and paid on a timely basis is undertaken by our Assistant Treasurer Mags Noy. She is always volunteering behind the scenes to ensure appropriate controls are in place, even in 2019 whilst recovering from significant surgery. She also runs the Ground bookings and ensures the Club's facilities are unlocked and in working order week on week.

Accordingly, in finalising my report, I want to express my special thanks to Mags for being so accommodating of change to our systems and the Treasurer role in 2019.

CANTEEN REPORT

The margin contribution of the canteen in 2019 was a record \$23,400 on \$41,500 turnover exclusive of GST adjustments. This compares to \$21,400 margin on \$38,400 sales in 2018 and \$20,500 on \$37,900 in 2017. We had slightly fewer Premier 1 home days which had some impact on turnover. The key drivers of the profitability improvement was our hosting of a Bunnings Sausage Sizzle in February and a very significant canteen product sponsorship by More Than Meat butchers at Gympie. We encourage all Club members to repay this generous sponsorship with personal purchases of meat.

Whilst the canteen is a critical part of the Club's financial viability, it is far more important than that. It enhances the reputation of the Club by providing a good atmosphere and value offering to members, visitors and spectators in a vibrant Clubhouse atmosphere. It was open this year for both mens and womens Club competition matches, as well as SEHA Finals, Summer Hockey, the Club's Gala Day for Primary Schools, and Minkeys on Fridays. A conscious attempt was made this year to encourage opposition players to join us in the Clubhouse for a drink and Best & Fairest awards after men's games and this was very well received by other Clubs. Hopefully this will become a routine and very positive aspect of our home matches.

The canteen's success is a tribute to the entire membership of the Club, from the President, Craig Turner for his efficiency in rostering, to the team of Duty Officers who controlled operations on nominated days with good humour and great efficiency, and the many Club members and parents who supported on both sides of the counter during the year (as workers and as customers). The Duty Officer role was performed magnificently so thanks to all who regularly fulfilled this critical function: Nicole & Tony Neale, Michael Rose, Brett Bryant, Kevin Margetson, Cathy & Tony O'Leary, Ann-Marie Halyard, Steve Harvey, Garry Thomas, Luke Domrow, Andrew Hoy, David Richardson, Lee-Anne Callinan, Jo Griffiths, Frank Rowling, Mark Bayley, Ray Northwood, John Mulcair, Phil Rowling, Bev Williams, Angelo Donni, Terri Lloyd, Brad Bollard, Matt Morris, Deb Lenzo, Matt & Lisa Keelan, Brad & Jess Shipp, Michelle & Jose Hernandez.

Trish & Peter Krepp deserve special mention for their tireless efforts in canteen operations, in both purchasing and serving, particularly during a 7 week holiday absence mid-year by myself.

The introduction of a Bunnings Sausage Sizzle hosting in February was a highlight. It earned a \$1200 margin but it took a lot of work by many Club members, but particularly Michael Rose and Peter & Trish Krepp. Hopefully this will become a regular event each year.

Two big operational highlights were the Primary Schools Gala day in September (a record 19 teams) and the Herb Fibbins junior carnival when the Club hosted 18 teams from all over the State. The support of the Club membership on this day was amazing. The Herb Fibbins day generated some \$2400 margin on canteen, raffles & cake sales, plus additional contribution from team entry fees (less costs for umpires, trophies and first aid).

Plans to conduct 2 or 3 social events in the Clubhouse disappointingly did not come to fruition and this is an opportunity to significantly enhance general Club morale as well as finances.

All our club readers and media users owe a debt to Craig Turner and Tony O'Leary, who brought some seriously impressive photo gear to record games; to Rory Staples, who submitted pictures, often from a couple of games each weekend; and to Tony Stark, who became a contributor late in the season, and hopefully will be a regular next season. Anna Domrow juggled managing and taking pictures at some games and turned in some fine pictures. Your newsletter editor would like to thank all the junior, men's and women's teams coaches and managers for their unfailing help while he was wandering about getting pictures from the sidelines during the year. More Sutho Snappers are welcome.

Tasks suggested for the off-season include refreshing our website. It still looks good, but changes and general growing up of people in its pictures mean change is needed. Improved functionality, delivering greater value to sponsors and some management issues also bear some thought. Ideas are welcome.

Thanks again to everyone who helped in our club communications during 2019.

JUNIOR CONVENOR'S REPORT

As the 2019 season of outdoor winter hockey draws to a close, it seems so long ago that the Committee and others were beavering away behind the scenes in December, January and February organising and completing two major projects for the club that would have significant positive impacts during the season.

It had been many years in the planning and many years of saving that ensured the club was able to replace its turf pitch in the off-season and we've now enjoyed a fruitful season of hockey on our new playing pitch. It looks and plays fantastic and along with the new movable training goals and goal storage bays, these will ensure more effective training sessions and enjoyable years of hockey ahead. Many hands were involved over the years, however a big thank you to the more recent project leader, Peter Tait, who kept the project on track.

The other major change this year was the implementation of our new Majestri database and member registration system. It was a late decision to implement the new database and go paperless for member registrations this season, but many hours of dedication during the off-season by Sarah Dredge and Luke and Anna Domrow in particular ensured the database was up and running in time for the 2019 registrations. Thanks to the dedication of these members, the club now has online registration, a proper database and additional communication tool available to benefit the operations of the club.

However there was no resting on our laurels with the new pitch installed and new database implemented, February came round super-quick with online registrations streaming in and junior trials to organise. It had been a very successful season of hockey the prior season and off the back of that success we enjoyed increased junior registrations for the 2019 season. There were extra participants in the Minkey Program and the club fielded 13 junior teams, which was one more team than the prior season. So February was a very hectic period with many Committee members, prior year coaches and managers, and parents enlisted to put the juniors through their paces and sorted into teams. And it wasn't too many training sessions later that the Metro competition commenced in March and the SEHA junior competition commenced in April.

Following registrations, trials and games starting, the winter season of junior hockey continued to be very busy and productive for the Sutherland club, involving:

- 224 junior players in 2019, including 56 registered in the Minkey Program for 5-9 year olds;
- 13 mixed junior teams in the 2019 winter season, with three teams in each of the under 11, 13 and 17 age groups, and four teams in the under 15 age group;
- 11 of these teams competed in the South East Hockey Association (SEHA) junior competition and 2 teams (U15 and U17) competed in the Sydney-wide Metro Competition;
- the Minkey Program was held on Friday afternoons in Terms 2 and 3 and continues to introduce hockey to growing numbers of budding juniors and is a successful feeder of enthusiastic and talented players into our Under 11 teams each season;

- a very successful Herb Fibbins Association Carnival for Under 11 players was held in June involving 19 teams (3 more teams than 2018) across A and B Divisions in which players revelled in the carnival atmosphere and also raised funds for the club;
- the Junior Academy Program was held during Term 2 and saw multiple groups of juniors receive additional expert coaching from Kieran Govers and fellow senior players to further develop their hockey skills; and
- work continues in earnest to ensure the Primary School Gala day as well as the Tradies Summer Schools Hockey competition in term 4 are successful – each enabling a broader group of children to experience hockey, as well as raising funds for the club.

Considerable behind the scenes work in organising and promoting many events involving the junior players throughout the year goes largely unnoticed by participants and supporters. The particular efforts of Peter Krepp, Trish Krepp, John Cowan and Ray Northwood in organising and running the Minkey Program, the Primary School Gala day, the Tradies Summer Schools competition, and the Junior Academy Program is tremendous and draining. Their continued support of the club's junior development and fundraising activities is outstanding. Also, the efforts of Craig Turner to again organise the U11 Herb Fibbins Association carnival should not go unrecognised. This competition draws high praise from all participating teams and also is a major funding contributor for the club. The efforts by these and many other people behind the scenes is what continues to grow and develop junior hockey at the Sutherland Hockey Club and keep a lid on fees.

As I continue to point out, success for the junior side of the Sutherland club is not measured in finals appearances, Minor Premierships or even Premierships attained by the Sutho junior teams competing. These may be important achievements that should be recognised due to the significant efforts of players and others involved in the team. However, more importantly, success is measured by the enjoyment and skill development of the players from week to week during the pre-season training and trials, and then during the various competition games. And it's amazing what happens when players are developing their hockey skills and enjoying playing hockey in a team environment:

- of the 13 junior teams, the overall strength of the club was again demonstrated with 12 of those teams qualifying for the semi-finals (with the unlucky Under 15 team missing a spot in the semi-finals on a goals scored count-back);
- some amazing semi-final matches were played and 7 of those 12 teams won their way through to the Grand Final match for their particular division/competition;
- it was also a high success rate in the Grand Final matches with 5 of the 7 teams taking out their respective premierships (11A, 11B, 13A, 13B and the SEHA U17 competitions) – so it was a very busy September for the club supporting all the teams competing in the finals series of both competitions; and
- large numbers of junior players played in junior representative teams, rewarding their efforts concentrating at training sessions, practicing their skills and applying these in the game environment.

In relation to representative teams, many players were selected in school and other representative teams in 2019, however special mention should go to the following players for earning high representative honours:

- Christopher Goodman – selected in the NSW U13 Stars Team
- Kian Johnson – selected in the NSW U15 State Team
- Kendelle Tait – selected in the NSW and Australian U16 All Schools Teams, as well as the NSW U18 Blues Team
- Harry Roberts – selected in the NSW U18 Blues Team.

At the Junior Presentation, the club recognised a number of people who have contributed to the junior side of the club in 2019 (and prior seasons). Junior Service Awards were awarded to Peter Krepp, Cathie O’Leary and Matt Morris for their continued behind the scenes dedication to ensure the juniors continues to function well. Junior Service Awards were also awarded to Paris Barnard, Lachlan Staples and Megan Harrison for their involvement in coaching and guiding our junior players, particularly the participants in the Minkey Program this year.

The direct influencers determining whether the junior side of the club is successful continues to be the coaches and managers week in week out. They are at the frontline ensuring that the junior players are enjoying playing hockey and developing their hockey skills – this requires considerable time and effort to manage the players (and parents). I would like to thank the coaches and managers for stepping up and committing to their teams.

The Age Coordinators also supported the coaches and managers, and deserve a special mention: Kevin Margetson (U11), Brad Bollard (U13) and Cathie O’Leary (U17). Garry Thomas is another person who contributed significantly through his early season efforts as Equipment Officer and Uniform Officer. Matt Morris contributed through his tireless role each week collating the match cards and junior records. Craig Turner managed the junior umpiring program again in 2019 with great success and further development of the current crop of junior umpires. I thank you all for agreeing to take on these roles. We would not have been able to get the teams sorted and the season underway without your efforts – it was very much appreciated.

Thanks also to the support of the parents – your ongoing encouragement of the players is invaluable – and your broader support for the teams and club by helping out in the canteen and as duty officers is appreciated. Parent, grandparent and guardian support in these areas is incredibly important for the Club – it assists with fundraising for the Club and provides an opportunity for the players to indulge in various treats after their games!

There were many contributors and supporters during the season that enabled the players to enjoy their hockey and the junior side of the club to grow and blossom in 2019. I thank you all for getting involved and look forward to further success for junior hockey at the Sutherland Hockey Club in 2020.

2019 Sutho Junior Hockey Academy

in 2019, I had the pleasure of taking over the Academy that was previously run by JC and Kreppy. It was a great chance for myself to see the potential the club has in its juniors.

The aim at the start was to run 3 x 4 week blocks to accommodate all age groups. Unfortunately, with my work commitments I was only able to run 2x4 week blocks, for u11s to u15s.

My aim as a coach is to instill the basics and fundamentals of hockey in my session. Any coach can just put markers down and tell the kids to run around them or play games for an hour which just = babysitting.

Also with the kids hearing it from a different voice makes it a new experience and another learning avenue as must kids get the same coach/voice for many years.

The session I ran every Wednesdays 6-7 were based around:

- Basic skills
- Pushing
- Trapping
- Hitting
- Dribbling
- Jinking
- Leading
- Hand position on the stick
- Body position
- Balance
- Hand eye coordination

A couple weeks into the academy I got wind that there were a few remarks that my sessions were boring. This just shows you how far behind we are in our hockey mentality and training. For session to be fun we have to tick off the basic skills within our game. Everyone is at a different level so I try and teach/preach to each athlete that it doesn't matter what drill or exercise you're doing, you do it to the best of your ability and challenge yourself to be better within that certain drill/skill. This is what I try and teach coaches to teach as well as you can't make a session for each individual according to their ability, you make everyone fit into a drill evenly.

The athletes I have were very quick learners. I had great pleasure in running each session as I could see the progression happening. Coaches just have to keep reminding their players that you don't master a skill overnight, it takes a lot of practice and repetition.

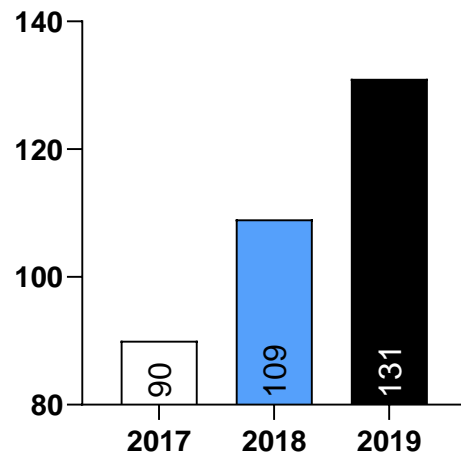

MEN'S CONVENOR REPORT

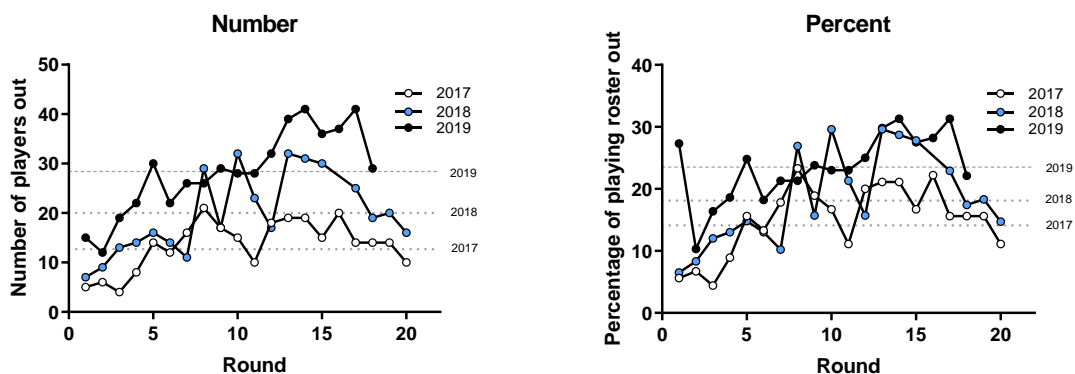
This was the second year of this Committee position, which superseded the previous Club Captain role. I still believe that this role aims to have a more holistic approach to managing our Men's teams and be a key contact person with Sydney Hockey.

This year saw us field 8 men's teams for the first time, after fielding 7 last year. The large number of players at the beginning of the season was a great surprise and required some modelling to see if we could handle the mid-season exodus of players to the physio or ski fields like last year. In the end, we nominated an 8th grade side in Sydney League 4, meaning we had teams in 8 of 9 divisions - Premier League 1 to 4 and Sydney League 1 to 4. This meant we were the 2nd largest Men's Club in Sydney, behind Ryde (who had 11 teams!). We created a new 6th grade side with last year's 6th grade captained by Mark Brookfield as our 7th grade playing in SL3, and last year's 7th grade team captained by Mark Bayley playing in SL4 as our 8th grade. By the end of the season we had a playing roster of 131 and had seen a large number of our U/15 and U/17 boys making their senior Men's debut and the return of quite a few guys.

This season, we again offered a '6 games for \$150' package to those who couldn't commit to a full season and helped to fill in when we were light on numbers. We had at least 5 guys take up the offer this season, with the 3 who registered for this package last season all registering for a full season this year. I still think this initiative was successful and one to continue with and promote heavily next year. There is some interest from HNSW following a brief discussion with representatives earlier in the season. Initiatives like this are critical to be able to put 8 competitive teams on the field again as there were times throughout the season when we had a



very large number of players unavailable (see above charts).

Our coaching roster was very similar to last year with:

- Peter Tait and Jay Holley returning to coach 1st grade,
- Blake Sharp stepped up to captain/coach 2nd grade with assistance from Grant Hollyman, and
- Myself coordinating 3rd to 8th grade with major assistance from Brad Bollard, Jay Kelly, Mark Bonnici, Brendon Hol, Jimmy Northwood, and with significant contributions from Sean Kelly.

The leadership for each team again was similar to last season but with an additional team. I'd very much like to thank the following for running our teams:

- 1st grade - Coaches Peter Tait and Jay Holley, Manager Peter Krepp and Captain Mitch Wray
- 2nd grade - Captain/Coach Blake 'Donk' Sharp, Manager Tony Neale, Grant Hollyman
- 3rd grade - Captain/Manager Brad Bollard and Jay Kelly
- 4th grade - Captain/Manager Mark Bonnici, assisted by Brendo Hol, Jimmy Northwood and Sean Kelly
- 6th grade – Captain/Manager Phil Rowling, with assistance from Matt Stevens, and Bryn Davies, and Lachie Rowling as the occasional guest coach
- 7th grade – Captain/Manager Mark Brookfield
- 8th grade - Captain/Manager Mark Bayley

I looked after 5th grade again, and so we had a great distribution of experience across all our teams to help guide them around the park and deal with the administrative tasks (more on that below).

All teams had strong pre-seasons, which again included many of our younger players joining in with 1st/2nd grade. We then had 3 weeks of Sunday morning trials to assist in the selection of the 2nd grade squad and the 3rd-4th grade squads. These were very well attended, and the quality of the hit-outs meant that it was tough for the selectors to make their decisions. First grade again played a trial game against Canberra Club Central, this year in Canberra and took some of the young fringe players away for the experience. Unlike last year, our other sides didn't play pre-season games due to other Clubs not being as organised as us.

Our weekly training schedule for our Men's sides changed this year. Tuesdays were for the 3rd-4th grade squad; Wednesdays were 1st and 2nd grade sides, and Thursdays were for a combined 1st/2nd grade squad (7pm to 8:15pm) followed by 5th to 8th grade (8pm to 9:15pm). This certainly improved the quality and intensity of the 3rd-4th grade training, and I think the 5th to 8th grade trainings were of high-quality, but the ~1 h did go very quickly. All of this was achieved without any deleterious effects on 1st and 2nd grade access to training time.

This season, Sydney Hockey ran an 18 round competition, starting with Sydney League playing their 1st round one week before the start of Premier League. The structure was controversial, with PL1 only having 10 teams, PL2 to 4 having 12 teams, and SL1 to 5 all having 10 teams each. Sydney Hockey ran a 10 team, 18 round comp and a 12 team 18 round comp, which obviously had its issues. Thankfully, our four PL sides all played at home together, as did our four SL teams. However, our away games (almost) always saw our 1st grade side playing away from our 2nd to 4th grade sides, and our SL sides were often spread across Sydney.

At the end of the regular season, we had 5 teams make Finals; with 6th grade finishing 5th (but only 5 points behind 4th place), 7th grade finishing equal 5th place (6th on goal difference, 10 points behind 4th place) and 8th grade finishing 6th (18 points behind 4th). This is a massive achievement in our first year running 8 teams.

1st grade finished 2nd on the table (including Matt Bennett again being the top goalscorer), 2nd grade finished 3rd, and 3rd, 4th and 5th grade finished 4th. The finals:

1. 1st grade lost in week 1 to Moorebank, drew with NWS in the Semi-Final, making it to Grand Final, losing to Moorebank 0:3,
2. 2nd grade beating Briars 3:2 in week 1 but lost to UNSW 1:4 in the Semi-Final,
3. 3rd grade lost 1:2 to Moorebank in week 1,
4. 4th grade lost 1:2 to Sydney Uni in week 1,
5. 5th grade won the Minor Semi against UNSW but lost in Prelim Final to Manly,

In the end, we had a large number of players reach major milestones in the number of games played for the Club, which included:

- 400 games – Matthew Rowling
- 300 games – Michael Sharkey, Matthew Phillips
- 200 games – Ross Angus, David Lucas
- 100 games – Christian Halyard, Gilbert Gough-Fuller, Jay Kelly, Nic Rose, Tim Crismale, Ty Stephens, Zac Nyrhinen, Brady Anderson, Mitch Shipp

Outside the playing achievements playing in Sutho HC Blue, many of our members achieved representative honours. This included:

- Jack Hayes was selected in the Kookaburras. We also signed Blake Govers this season. Both Jack and Blake played 2 games for us this season and ran a school holidays skills clinic too which was a great success,
- Brady Anderson (1st grade) was selected in the U/21 Australian Indoor squad,
- Zac Nyrhinen (NSW Country), Iain McClung and Joe Huston (Aus Defence Force; all 2nd grade) all participated at the Australian Country Championships, with Zac being selected in the U/21 Australian Country squad,
- Brad Bollard (O/40's), John Hol (O/65's) and Ray Northwood (O/70's and Vice-Captain) all participated at the Aus Masters Championships,
- Harry Roberts (1st grade) and Kian Johnson (3rd grade) were selected in the 2019 NSW U/18 Blues and U/15 State teams respectively,
- Harry Roberts, Matthew Turner (2nd grade) Angus Callinan (3rd grade) were selected in the 2019 NSW U/18 squad (AAP), and Kian Johnson selected in the 2019 NSW U/15 squad (AAP),
- Daniel Bryant (3rd grade), Angus Callinan (3rd grade), Blake Hernandez (2nd grade), Charles Johnston (4th grade), Kian Johnson (3rd grade), Scott Crisafi (3rd grade) were selected in the 2020 NSW U/18 squad (AAP),
- Off the field, 1st grade coach Peter Tait was the Assistant Coach for the NSW U/21 Men's side who won gold at the National Championships.

Alongside the increase in playing numbers, this season also saw Sutho HC contributing to the officiating of the Sydney Hockey competition. This included Lachlan Cartwright and me playing and umpiring throughout the season and Blake 'Bilco' Sanford umpiring. Bilco was awarded the

John “Smellie” Scott Umpire of the Year Award and officiated the PL2 Grand Final – he would have done the PL1 if it wasn’t for Sutho playing. At the other end of the spectrum, I umpired the SL3 Grand Final.

This season I continued regular communications to our Senior players using MailChimp. This constituted a Sunday/Monday Newsletter to the entire membership (Juniors, Women’s, Men’s) that contained match results and game times, best and fairest votes, Member of the Week, and Club Announcements. The mid-week Newsletter contained Men’s team selections alongside duty team/officer information plus Club Announcements. On average, ~70% of the Men’s mailing list (234 subscribers) opened the Men’s only newsletters whereas ~50% of the much large all-member mailing list (430) opened the Combined Newsletter. The newsletters complimented John Mulcair’s collated match reports that were posted to the Club’s website. These reports were fairly well supported by all 8 Men’s teams with photos provided by Tony O’Leary, Craig Turner and John himself, with some coming from the coaches of some junior teams.

Sydney Hockey again put the data entry activities back on the Clubs, which required team managers to upload all the information into the Revolutionise Sports platform. It was again expertly coordinated by Steve Harvey, and I think we did pretty well, mostly meeting the timeline and accuracy requirements. This could not have been achieved without all the hard work of Steve and I thank him for all his hard work.

be ready but the exposure both in games and training is critical to the club's long term development and success. As 1st grade coach I faced some major push back on my strong view on this.

If our younger talented players are not provided opportunities they will be offered positions at other clubs, whilst some may have of view of just letting them go, this would be a travesty for the club after the time we have spent developing these players to just let other Sydney clubs poach them. With some pending retirements in the next 1-2 years from 1st grade this is critical for the coaches to reform a new view and be on the same page.

We were lucky to have Jack Hayes comeback to play for Sutho for 2 games after the FIH Proleague in July and welcomed Blake Govers in blue for the first time in senior for us (Blake previously trained as a junior with Sutho). Blake was the leading goal scorer for the Proleague in 2019. It is always a pleasure these quality players around our group. Unfortunately, SHA rules would not allow Jack to play finals when he was available which will hopefully be addressed in 2020. Having the best players available to play finals in Sydney is critical as new forms of the game come on line such as Hockey One.

2018 LIFE MEMBERSHIP – Bill Melchert

Bill has a lifetime of involvement in hockey. He was a Life Member at Commercials Hockey Club in Townsville, when in 1978 he made the move to Sydney. Bill was retired from playing, but his two boys, Andrew and Ian, would soon be looking to play hockey – and as Shire residents they landed at Sutherland District Hockey Club.

In 1981 our Club's junior program was just two teams – and much in need of a revival. That began in 1982, and Bill was part of the revitalised junior program from the early years. During the 80s Bill was regularly a coach or manager of Club or Sydney Junior teams, a Sutho Junior Committee member, and a delegate for a number of years to the Sydney Central Area Junior Competition Committee.

Together with Kevin Connelly and Warren Hollyman, Bill was very involved in the coach and country player recruitment activities of the mid 1980s that were critical to progressively lifting the on-field competitiveness of our 1st grade men's team. Tamworth was a particularly rich source of recruits. Ultimately this was transformational for the Club.

Bill was on the Club Committee as Ground Convenor in 1989 and 1990. At this time he was part of the small project team, led by Denis Walker, which managed the Council approval and then the installation in 1990 of the Club's first (sand-based) synthetic field at Sylvania Hockey Park. Along with the other project team members, he devoted hundreds of hours to making that synthetic field become reality (just the 2nd club field in Sydney after Moorebank).

Bill was Manager of our 1st grade men's team for 4 years (1989-1992), a particularly successful period for the team in terms of HNSW State League titles and SHA 1st Grade Premierships.

Over many years Bill has been our “go to guy” for so many construction, maintenance or repair jobs around the ground. With a few mates he built the original dugouts for the synthetic field, he designed and installed the safety netting on the eastern, northern and western side of the field, but his real specialty has been goalboxes – whether the heavyweight, almost indestructible version used for full field games, or the small goal boxes used for ¼ field summer schools hockey games.

Bill's current role in maintaining our ground goes back at least 10 years. In that time he has done a lot more to maintain and enhance our facilities than a weekly sweep of leaf litter etc. from the playing surface and occasional gluing of a lifted seam on the playing carpet. His sustained commitment, and the care he has taken in keeping our fencing/netting, dugouts, goals, playing surface and surrounds in the best possible condition has been of enormous value to the Club and something we could not have done without Bill's involvement. His support for the Club in this regard has been specifically mentioned in multiple Annual Reports.

Bill was a recipient of the Club's Outstanding Service Award in 1992, 1999 and 2017.

Bill has made a significant contribution to the Sutherland Hockey club over a period of nearly 40 years which continues to this day. The Committee recommends Bill's appointment as Life Member.
